WE CANNOT BE SLAVE TO BOTH SIN AND GOD - MAKE THE CHOICE NOW

The wasteful steward, represents the children of this world or the Unbelievers, who waste the gifts of Faith and Life. The steward understood his time was up (symbolising our death), but cleverly put into action a plan to selfishly save himself and ensure his earthly future. In his dishonesty to his master, he also benefited others. Jesus notes how unbelievers can be more shrewder about their future, than we, who are, the children of the Light (the Believers).

BE SPIRITUALLY SHREWD/ASTUTE

Jesus obviously told this story not to encourage dishonesty but to draw attention to the foresight of the steward. He is teaching us to become spiritually astute when planning our own divine future, so that we will be welcome in Heaven. It is wise to be fully prepared when the Lord, calls us to account, for the lives He gave us. We need to be constantly reminded that we are the stewards and never the owners of what we possess. Our bodies and lives are the property of God and we are simply stewards appointed to take care of these temples, on loan from God.

MONEY IS A LIMITED RESOURCE

Money may have secured a temporary welcome for the dishonest steward, in the earthly homes of those whose debt he reduced, but money will not purchase a welcome into the Heavenly Home. What will ensure a welcome, is for us to spend ourselves wisely in charity, for the sake of others. To wipe out all outstanding spiritual debt owed to us, by forgiving those who offend, betray and trespass against us. Jesus wiped clean the eternal debt we owed to the Father, by showing Mercy on the Cross. It was a debt we created by sinning. We are still called to die to our sins and forgive.

THE PRINCIPLE OF LIFE

The unjust steward selfishly saw his master's resources, as a means for his own personal enjoyment and advancement. This represents the Unbelievers who steal full ownership of their bodies, given to them by God. They live for themselves and do as they please. If we understand the principle that everything we own is a gift from God, then we understand that God is the owner of everything and that we are His stewards. We are to use God's resources (faith and life), to further His goal of Salvation for the World. We can do this by reducing or removing any burden (suffering), we have caused to our neighbour, by mercy.

FORGIVE US OUR DEBT AS WE FORGIVE OUR DEBTORS

Nobody should be in debt to us. If Jesus wiped out our debt to Him, then we must wipe out other peoples debt to us. We are not qualified to hold others accountable, because of our selfish pride. Judging others, adds a heavy burden of emotional debt on them. Learn from the unjust steward but be just in making life easier for those living and working around us, by forgiving those who are indebted to us, which means those who sinned against us. Like Jesus, the faithful Steward, let's contribute to the eternal debt, owed to God, by spending love and mercy on each other. God bless, Fr. Brendan.
